OCCC film clinics provide sneak peek into industry

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Aspiring moviemakers will have an opportunity to attend workshops and create short films during the Oklahoma Film Institute's Cinema Clinics at Oklahoma City Community College.

Three-day workshops in movie production, directing, script writing and editing will be held in June and July, OCCC film and video professor Greg Mellott said.

"It's a really good chance for people that aren't sure if they have a knack for filmmaking to see what writing and directing is like," he said.

One of the instructors is Gray Frederickson, OCCC's artist-in-residence. Frederickson produced all three "Godfather" movies and "Apocalypse Now." He won an Oscar for "Godfather II."


"This would cost a fortune out in Hollywood to have access to expertise like this," Mellott said.

The three-day clinics will be Thursdays through Saturdays. The five-day clinic will be Monday through Friday.

Frederickson will teach a class on production June 3-5, and Mellot will teach a workshop on directing June 10-12.

A script writing course taught by Mellot will be June 17-19, and a course on editing will be June 24-26. Registration for each of the three-day workshops will cost \$300. Students will create a short movie during a workshop July 12-16.

"There is nothing like this in this part of the country," Frederickson said. "It's a good concept. It gets their feet wet and helps them find out if this is something they really want to pursue."
