"Pathway to Success" Instructor Training for Multicultural, International, and Low-Income Students

One of our Achieving the Dream initiatives is concentrated on improving our students' achievement and success. The "Pathway to Success" workshop materials offer training and tips focusing on instruction, methodology, and materials targeted to increase academic student success for our multicultural, international, and low-income students. More generally, these materials are applicable to a majority of our student population.

The workshop provides teaching strategies, lesson assignments, and activities along with a list of reference and resource materials which are available in the OCCC library. The material is concentrated on the following areas: how to teach writing and/or English Composition to Multicultural students, learning about cultural differences and diverse learning styles, and the affects of generational poverty on student success. The materials include are Session DVDs, classroom materials, and instructor resources for the classroom. This material assists in providing our high risk, high promise students a "Path to Success."

The workshop consists of nine sessions. Faculty completing all nine sessions will be awarded a Certificate of Completion. DVDs of sessions, copies of handouts, and resource books have been placed in the library. Faculty may receive credit toward a Certificate of Completion by viewing the session DVDs, reading the resource materials and/or books, and completing the proper forms.

Do any of the following describe you?

Do you know which churches have the best rummage sales and when?

Do you know which grocery stores' trash bins can be accessed for thrown away food?

Do you know what problems to look for in a used car?

Do you know how to move in a half a day?

Can you get by without a car?

If you answered yes to any of these questions, you could possibly survive in poverty. The above questions help us realize the differences in the social classes that exist in our society. The differences can create a set of "hidden rules" that often prevent people from migrating between social classes. While we like to think that we and our students have unlimited opportunities for success, we are often limited by our prior experiences and knowledge.

As we plan our courses:

- What considerations are we making to allow for students from a variety of backgrounds to be successful in our courses?
- What scaffolding do we provide to our students that will prepare them to potentially increase the income level in their household?
- How are we preparing them for the ramifications an income change can bring to their social life and their home?

All of the anticipated positive changes our students will experience can result in feelings of anxiety if they are unprepared. As we touch students' lives through our courses, advising, and individual conversations, we have the opportunity to consistently cast a vision for their future and help them grasp the tools they need to navigate the changing waters. As result of our efforts, our students will be a glowing success and so will we!
