Oklahoma City Community College (OCCC) Capitol Hill Center Fiscal Years 2005 to 2009

The OCCC Capitol Hill Center develops and implements English/ Spanish bilingual programs that will meet community needs, enhance access to and promote the use of basic technology in education for adults, youth and senior citizens. Located in a high poverty, Latino neighborhood, the Center is within a three-mile distance of five urban high schools: Capitol Hill, Southeast, US Grant, Santa Fe, and Mount Saint Mary. Its goal is to serve the urban, mostly Hispanic community of Oklahoma City's Empowerment Zone by continually exploring ways to enrich its programs and better assist community residents. The center is recognized as a leader in building on the social assets of this diverse community and collaborating with other community organizations to promote educational development and economic growth.

Throughout the years our Open Computer Lab Program has provided services to thousands of members of the community who came in with questions and concerns about their education, searching for computer classes, needing to use a computer or inquiring about computer functions. Satisfying these needs, enables these community members to continue their education and better their lives.

Oklahoma City Community College Capitol Hill Center's Mission

To provide access to quality educational and cultural programs to the Hispanic community and to the citizens of Oklahoma based on curricula that will promote and encourage an understanding of the cultural differences between diverse communities and prepare students to achieve their educational and employment goals.

In the fiscal years 2005 to 2009, the Oklahoma City Community College Capitol Hill Center received 34,523 visitors who attended our programs.

Improving Academic Achievement of High School Students Project

Our goal is to improve student grades and student graduation from high school and subsequent enrollment in college. This program will target at-risk high school students in the Capitol Hill community and South Oklahoma City. It will include offering remedial courses in the following core academic courses: language arts, mathematics, social studies, and English as a second language. All courses are taught by qualified teachers with the aid of computers and the appropriate software and offered at no cost to the students. Additionally, this project will focus on the increased accountability of students. Classroom teachers will be able to communicate online with project personnel to inquire about attendance and effort of their students as well as recommend specific areas of the curriculum in which students need more exposure.
