The project provides needed training and education to our **English Composition adjuncts and** full-time faculty in the following areas: how to teach English Composition to Multicultural students, learning about cultural differences and diverse learning styles, the affects of generational poverty on student success, materials and resources for the classroom and Communication Lab. and additions to the Comp I packet to include changes in

teaching approaches, lesson assignments, and activities for the multicultural students and low-income students. We believe this project will give our high risk, high promise students a "Path to Success."
