

English 1113*	6.2%	68.4%	2.2%	58.6%	59.5%	1.1%
SCL 1001	71.9%	72.7%	0.8%	71.8%	72.8%	1.0%

* English 1113 has adopted a co-requisite model and has seen a slight increase in enrollment



Lessons Learned

- Course Redesigns aren't unique to OCCC
- Systemic common language is valuable
- Shared campus vision is needed for classroom design and functionality
- Time for faculty to discuss content and strategies is beneficial



Lessons Learned

- Two hours per week is a minimum for efficiency
- Adjunct faculty want additional training on content and instructional strategies
- Adjunct faculty are appreciative of the course product
- Communities of Practice developed in content areas and divisions
