OKLAHOMA CITY COMMUNITY COLLEGE DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE PREVENTION PROGRAM

As a requirement of the Federal Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Regulations (Edgar Part 86), Oklahoma City Community College is required to disseminate the below notification to all students and employees on an annual basis. This process is formally conducted through collaboration between the offices of Human Resources, Student Accessibility and Support (SAS), and the Campus Police. Questions concerning this information can be addressed to any of these offices or the specific office identified throughout the information.

Oklahoma City Community College has a firm commitment to provide its students and employees a healthy and safe learning and working environment. The illegal or unauthorized possession, use of, being under the influence of, or distribution of drugs or alcoholic beverages seriously affects the College environment as well as the individual potential for success of our students and employees. Disciplinary actions will be taken against any student or employee found to be possessing, using, or distributing illicit drugs or alcohol on College property or as part of any College activity. It is our goal that the following information clarifies the standards of conduct, legal requirements, health risks, and help that is available to all students, staff, and faculty members who may abuse or be dependent upon alcohol or drugs.

The Drug Free Schools and Campuses Regulations of the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act requires an institution of higher education, such as the Oklahoma City Community College (OCCC), to certify that it has implemented programs to prevent the abuse of alcohol and use and/or distribution of illicit drugs both by OCCC students and employees either on its premises and as part of its activities. At a minimum, an institution of higher education must annually distribute the following in writing to all students and employees:

- Standards of conduct that clearly prohibit the unlawful possession, use, or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students and employees
- A description of the legal sanctions under local, state, or federal law for the unlawful possession or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol
- A description of the health risks associated with the use of illicit drugs and alcohol abuse
- A description of any drug or alcohol counseling, treatment, rehabilitation, or reentry programs that are available to employees or students
- A clear statement that the institution will impose sanctions on students and employees, a description of those sanctions, up to and including expulsion or termination of employment, and referral for prosecution for violations of the standards, conduct, or law

STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

Oklahoma City Community College prohibits the possession, use, or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students and employees on its property, and as part of any activities held by the institution. This includes any college sponsored on or off campus activities, such as officially sanctioned field trips, Student-sponsored social activities, Professional meetings attended by employees, and any college-sponsored activities abroad. OCCC prohibits unlawful activities associated with alcohol, including prohibition against use by students who are underage. The unlawful use of drugs or alcohol is inconsistent with the behavior expected of members of the OCCC community. Violations of this policy may result in criminal action as well as disciplinary action. State Sanctions

Oklahoma Drug Possession Laws

- Possession of a Controlled Dangerous Substance, any schedule, is a misdemeanor and carries a penalty of confinement for not more than one (1) year and by a fine not exceeding One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00).
- Transporting, or possession of a substance classified in Schedule I or II, except for marijuana, with an intent to distribute, upon conviction, shall be guilty of a felony, and shall be sentenced to a term of imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections for not more than seven (7) years and a fine of not more than One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), which shall be in addition to other punishment provided by law and shall not be imposed in lieu of other punishment.
 - A second conviction for the violation of provisions of this paragraph is a felony punishable by a term of imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections for not more than fourteen (14) years.
 - A third or subsequent conviction for the violation of the provisions of this paragraph is a felony punishable by a term of imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections for not more than twenty (20) years.
- Transporting or possession of any other controlled dangerous substance classified in Schedule III, IV, V or marijuana, with an intent to distribute, upon conviction, shall be guilty of a felony and shall be sentenced to a term of imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections for not more than five (5) years and a fine of not more than Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00), which shall be in addition to other punishment provided by law and shall not be imposed in lieu of other punishment.
 - A second conviction for the violation of the provisions of this paragraph is a felony punishable by a term of imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections for not more than ten (10) years.
 - A third or subsequent conviction for the violation of the provisions of this paragraph is a felony punishable by a term of imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections for not more than fifteen (15) years.
- Possession of an imitation controlled substance as defined by Section 2-101 of this title, with an intent to distribute, upon conviction, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be sentenced to a term of imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not more than one (1) year and a fine of not more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00).
 - A person convicted of a second violation of the provisions of this paragraph shall be guilty of a felony and shall be sentenced to a term of imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections for not more than two (2) years and a fine of not more than Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), which shall be in addition to other punishment provided by law and shall not be imposed in lieu of other punishment.

Oklahoma Alcohol Possession Laws

- It is unlawful for any person who shall, in any public place, or in or upon any passenger coach, streetcar, or in or upon any other vehicle commonly used for the transportation of passengers, or in or about any depot, platform, waiting station or room, drink or otherwise consume any intoxicating liquor unless authorized by the Oklahoma Alcoholic Beverage Control Act, intoxicating substance, or intoxicating compound of any kind, or inhale glue, paint, or other intoxicating substance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than Ten Dollars (\$10.00), nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), or by imprisonment for not less than five (5) days nor more than thirty (30) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
- No person under twenty-one (21) years of age shall consume or possess with the intent to consume low-point beer or any intoxicating beverage. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be guilty, upon conviction, of a misdemeanor and punished by a fine not to exceed Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) or ordered to perform community service not to exceed thirty (30) hours, or both such fine and community service. If the person has an Oklahoma driver license issued by the Department of Public Safety, that license shall be revoked for the period of time provided in Section 6-107.1 of Title 47 of the Oklahoma Statutes. If the person does not have an Oklahoma driver license, the person shall be ineligible to obtain an Oklahoma driver license for the period of time provided in Section 6-107.1 of Title 47 of the Oklahoma Statutes.
 - o For a second offense, any person who is convicted of violating the provisions of this subsection shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and punished by a fine of not to exceed Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) or ordered to perform community service not to exceed sixty (60) hours or both such fine and community service. In addition, if the person has an Oklahoma driver license issued by the Department of Public Safety, that license shall be revoked for the period of time provided in Section 6-107.1 of Title 47 of the Oklahoma Statutes. If the person does not have an Oklahoma

- driver license, the person shall be ineligible to obtain an Oklahoma driver license for the period of time provided in Section 6-107.1 of Title 47 of the Oklahoma Statutes.
- o For a third offense, any person who is convicted of violating the provisions of this subsection shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and punished by a fine of not to exceed Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) or ordered to perform community service not to exceed ninety (90) hours or both such fine and community service. In addition, if the person has an Oklahoma driver license issued by the Department of Public Safety, that license shall be revoked for the period of time provided in Section 6-107.1 of Title 47 of the Oklahoma Statutes. If the person does not have an Oklahoma driver license, the person shall be ineligible to obtain an Oklahoma driver license for the period of time provided in Section 6-107.1 of Title 47 of the Oklahoma Statutes.

Local Sanctions

Oklahoma City Municipal Drug Code

- It is unlawful for any person knowingly or intentionally to possess marijuana unless such substance was obtained directly, or pursuant to a valid prescription or order, from a practitioner, while acting in the course of his professional practice. Any person who violates any of the provision of this division shall be guilty of a Class "b" offense.
 - A person convicted of a Class "b" offense shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$1,200 plus cost and fees or imprisonment in the City Jain not exceeding six months or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Oklahoma City Municipal Alcohol Code

- It shall be unlawful for any person under 21 years of age to (1) consume or (2) possess with the intent to consume low-point beer, while such person is upon any public street, sidewalk, alley, building, or in any other public place. Any person who shall violate these provisions, upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine in any amount not to exceed a \$300 fine, together with the cost of such proceedings.
 - Any person convicted of a second violation of this section shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$500, together with the cost of such proceedings.
- No person shall knowingly transport in any moving vehicle upon a public highway, street, alley, or within any public park within the City, any low-point beer unless in the original container which is unopened, the seal unbroken and the original cap in place; unless the opened container be in the rear trunk or rear compartment, which shall include the spare tire compartment in a station wagon or panel truck, or any outside compartment which is not accessible to the driver or any other person in the vehicle while it is motion. Any persons who shall violate these provisions shall, upon conviction, be deemed guilty of a Class "A" offense.
 - o A person convicted of a Class "A" offense shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$500 excluding cost and fees.

OCCC Conduct Code

The section of the Student handbook entitled "Drug, Alcohol and Tobacco Free College" specifies that students abusing drugs or alcohol and/or violating the Student Conduct Code will be referred for disciplinary action. College policies concerning alcohol and drug use on campus are found in the Student Handbook and in the College Policies and Procedures (College Policies 1014 and 5001, as amended from time to time) which can be accessed through the OCCC website Home-Oklahoma City Community College (occc.edu). Additional employee and student sanctions for illicit drug use or alcohol use range from a verbal warning up to and including expulsion, termination from employment, and referral for prosecution for violations of the law.

OCCC Student Sanctions

- Written Warning: An official written notice that the student has violated College policies and that more severe conduct action will result should the student be involved in other violations while the student is enrolled at the College.
- **Apology Letter:** A typed and signed apology letter by the Respondent(s) acknowledging responsibility for the College violation(s). This letter provides a sincere expression of remorse to the Complainant(s) and/or stakeholder(s) of the community who experienced or endured the misconduct.
- Loss of Privileges: A limitation on a student's privileges for a period of time and may include, but is not limited to the denial of entry or usage of certain facilities or specific parts of campus, denial of opportunities to represent the College (in participation or leadership capacity), denial of participation in co-curricular activities indirectly associated with academics (i.e. attending campus programs/events, or participation in student organizations/clubs).
- Conduct Hold: A disciplinary hold will be placed on the student account preventing enrollment in future semesters until the matter is resolved. Holds may also limit access to campus, require special arrangements for records requests, and be utilized as a method of requiring the student to meet with the designated Hearing Officer prior to conducting normal College business.
- Educational and Behavioral Change Requirements: Assigned opportunities for assisted personal reflection, assessment, and development. These assigned opportunities include, but are not limited to, attending an alcohol education class/workshop, attending a drug education class/workshop, attending an antidiscrimination class/workshop, writing a reflection essay, attending and participating in a mental health assessment (and following the resulting recommendations), acquiring student success advisement, attending and participating in a civility or decision-making class/workshop, and/or other relevant educational opportunities).
- Class Removal: The student shall be administratively dropped from a class or moved to another section of a class. Faculty members, in consultation with the designated Hearing Officer, reserve the right to interim suspend a student from class pending the outcome a hearing for the student and the normal appeal process. Students who are suspended or expelled from the College will not be allowed to return to the class unless written authorization has been granted by the Associate Vice President for Student Affairs or designee. Note: The Associate Vice President for Student Affairs or designee will consult with the Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs and/or appropriate faculty to request classroom adjustments or exceptions for attendance and possibilities for assignment make-ups as instructors of record control their own classroom attendance policies.
- Assessments/Evaluations: A directive to attend and actively participate in as many appointments or sessions as necessary or recommended that will aid in the direction of the appropriate resolution of a case and/or the most effective sanction learning outcome. Outside Assessments by a third party health provider may be required by the Respondent(s), as deemed necessary for specific threats to campus, including self and/or others. Outside assessments will be the financial responsibility of the Respondent. Outside assessments will require 12 documentation to be submitted to the Hearing Officer and/or designated licensed counselor, prior to resuming normal student participation.
- No Contact Order: An absolute prohibition from contact with specified person or persons in any form whatsoever, including, but not limited to contact in person, by phone, electronically, social media, or through another person. A No Contact Order may be implemented as an interim measure for issues regarding sexual violence or other Title IX issues. Violating a No Contact Order may result in suspension from the College.

- **Temporary Suspension:** A type of temporary sanction, is an immediate and temporary separation between a student and the College campus during an initial assessment of a reported violation of this policy and/or during the duration of an investigation, due to the nature of the report, the initial identified patterns of risk or disruptive behavior(s), and/or current danger of presence on the College campus. In instances when a student has been temporarily suspended, a meeting to review the matter shall be scheduled by the Hearing Officer.
- **Restitution:** Compensation for the damage caused to the College or any person's property on campus. This is not a fine but rather a repayment for labor costs and/or value of property destroyed, damaged, consumed, or stolen.
- **Probation:** A specified period of time during which the student is placed on formal notice that he/she is not in good standing with the College and that further violations of College regulations will subject him/her to suspension or expulsion from the College.
- Suspension: The exclusion from enrollment in classes and other student privileges or activities for a definite period of time not to exceed five (5) years and until the conditions which are set forth in the hearing outcome letter are met. Students who are suspended from the College are not permitted on campus at any time for any reason during the period of suspension, unless otherwise permitted, in writing, by the Associate Vice President for Student Affairs or the designated Hearing Officer. A notation on the transcript is not made; however, a record of the action is maintained in the student's record in the Registrar's Office. (Note: The Registrar does not have access to conduct files, but does provide verification letters/background check information. When conduct history is properly requested, the Registrar or designee communicates with the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs for conduct information/history then conveys this information on any properly requested letters or forms. The Conduct records request form may be found on the OCCC Records website, Open Records: Request Form Oklahoma City Community College (occc.edu)). Any refund of tuition or fees will be subject to the College's normal withdrawal policy.
 - O At the conclusion of a suspension period, persons who desire to re-enroll will be required to participate in the Student Conduct Re-entry process, which consists of one or more follow up meetings with the designated Hearing Officer, Student Success Advisement for each semester of the remaining semesters at the College, composing a structured plan to overcome previous and current barriers to academic success, and assessment of other College resource needs.
 - o Persons who have violated further policies and/or local, state, or federal laws during their suspension period may not be allowed to re-enroll at the College.
- Expulsion: Expulsion is the termination of the relationship between the student and the College on an immediate and permanent basis. When a student is expelled, record of this action will be made a part of the student's permanent record and will 13 be noted on the student's transcript. A student who is expelled will not be allowed to re-enroll at the College. Students who are expelled from the College are not permitted on campus at any time for any reason.

Employee Sanctions

- **Informal Discussion:** An Informal Discussion is a discussion between the supervisor and the employee to address potential or minor performance and/or conduct deficiencies, and/or to clarify relevant policies, procedures, or practices.
- **Formal Discussion:** Formal Discussion with Memo to Employee ("Formal Discussion") is a discussion between the supervisor and the employee to address repeated or more serious performance and/or conduct

deficiencies. A Formal 2 Discussion may also be used where a prior Informal Discussion failed to resolve the issue.

- Written Reprimand: A Written Reprimand formalizes the discussion between the supervisor and the employee regarding repeated or more serious performance and/or conduct deficiencies. The Written Reprimand communicates to the employee the urgency of correcting the performance and/or conduct deficiency.
- Recommendation for Demotion, Loss of pay, suspension without pay or Termination of Employment: For major offenses or where prior positive discipline failed to correct the performance or conduct deficiencies, a Recommendation for Demotion, Disciplinary Loss of Pay, Suspension Without Pay or Recommendation for Termination of Employment ("Recommendation") may be appropriate.

HEALTH RISKS

There are many short and long-term health risks associated with drug and alcohol use. Some of these risks are:

Alcohol and the body

Brain: Alcohol interferes with the brain's communication pathways, and can affect the way the brain looks and works. These disruptions can change mood and behavior, and make it harder to think clearly and move with coordination.

Heart: Drinking a lot over a long time or too much on a single occasion can damage the heart, causing problems including:

- Cardiomyopathy Stretching and drooping of heart muscle
- Arrhythmias Irregular heart beat
- Stroke
- High blood pressure

Liver: Heavy drinking takes a toll on the liver, and can lead to a variety of problems and liver inflammations including:

- Steatosis, or fatty liver
- Alcoholic hepatitis
- Fibrosis
- Cirrhosis

Pancreas: Alcohol causes the pancreas to produce toxic substances that can eventually lead to pancreatitis, a dangerous inflammation and swelling of the blood vessels in the pancreas that prevents proper digestion.

Cancer: Drinking too much alcohol can increase your risk of developing certain cancers, including cancers of the:

- Mouth
- Esophagus
- Throat
- Liver
- Breast

^{*}Research also shows that drinking <u>moderate amounts of alcohol</u> may protect healthy adults from developing coronary heart disease.

Immune System: Drinking too much can weaken your immune system making your body a much easier target for disease. Chronic drinkers are more liable to contract diseases like pneumonia and tuberculosis than people who do not drink too much. Drinking a lot on a single occasion slows your body's ability to ward off infections – even up to 24 hours after getting drunk.
